

Jobs and Wages in the 501(c)(3) Nonprofit Sector in Washington State

OVERVIEW

The charitable nonprofit sector contributes to the overall health and vitality of every community in Washington State. The economic impact of the sector is less often recognized. The statistics available in this report show the scope and importance of nonprofits as major employers, and outline how nonprofit employment has been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The focus of this report is on charitable nonprofits, also known as 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organizations. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In 2019, 6,557 active 501(c)(3) nonprofits employed 252,949 people.

In 2020, nonprofit jobs dropped 6% to 238,032 statewide, although the number of nonprofit employers grew to 6,666.

Nonprofits make up 7.31% of the workforce of Washington, more than the construction industry or the hospitality industry.

The impact of the pandemic varied by subsector. For example, **the arts, culture, and recreation subsector lost 38% of jobs**, while the education subsector lost 7.6% and the social assistance subsector was down 5.5%. Impacts from the pandemic also differed greatly by county.





MAPPING NONPROFITS IN WASHINGTON STATE



Nonprofits exist in all counties in Washington. The map above shows the distribution of active charitable nonprofits, also known as 501(c)(3) organizations. **Overall, there are 24,375 charitable organizations active in Washington State in 2020.**

JOB AND WAGE TRENDS IN THE NONPROFIT SECTOR IN WASHINGTON




Most nonprofits are volunteer-based organizations with no employees. According to the Washington State Employment Security Department (ESD), 6,666 of our state's charitable nonprofits employed staff in 2020.

In 2020, the nonprofit sector employed 7.31% of the workforce in Washington, behind only four other sectors: Government, Healthcare and Social Assistance, Retail Trade, and Manufacturing. Nonprofits also paid 6.59% of all wages in the state.

Over the last four years, the non-profit sector experienced a steady and stable growth in the number of employers and the average salary paid to its employees. A similar pattern was observed for the number of employees until 2020. There was a significant drop in jobs in March and April of 2020 due to the global COVID-19 pandemic. Interestingly, the total amount of wages paid continued to grow even in 2020, which reflects rising average annual wages.

NONPROFIT JOBS AND WAGES BY COUNTY



The chart above shows data for Pierce County only. The <u>online presentation</u> of this data allows a user to generate charts showing wage and jobs data for all individual counties, legislative, and congressional districts in Washington State. A heat map also indicates the relative impact of the pandemic on nonprofit wage and jobs in 2020.

Data for rural counties is incomplete due to privacy considerations. Additional information is available in the methodology section.

CHANGE IN NONPROFIT EMPLOYMENT IN 2020

From January to December 2020, the number of jobs in the nonprofit sector fell 6%. Job losses were not spread evenly across all types of nonprofits. As shown by the line graphs on the next page, many subsectors showed a dramatic loss in jobs from March to April 2020 followed by slow, partial recovery.

The arts, entertainment, and recreation subsector was hit the hardest during the pandemic. This subsector lost 3,694 employees, or 38% of its workforce, over the course of 2020.

Almost every county experienced a significant decrease in nonprofit employment in 2020. The only exceptions are the counties where the nonprofit sector is primarily represented by healthcare and social assistance organizations.

The nonprofit sector remains vulnerable and has not yet fully recovered from the pandemic.

METHODOLOGY

The official taxonomy of economically active entities in the USA does not recognize nonprofit or charitable organizations as a separate sector, so these organizations are dispersed throughout other recognized sectors. Washington Nonprofits is grateful to the Washington State Employment Security Department (ESD) for their collaboration and assistance in our effort to bring the economic impact of the nonprofit sector into the spotlight. The data illustrates how valuable and important this sector is for the state's economy and various communities.

The primary data source used for the mapping project is Business Master File of the Exempt Organizations administered by the Internal Revenue Service. This dataset includes all tax-exempt organizations, including civic league and associations, labor organizations, chambers of commerce, social and recreational clubs etc. This report focuses only on 501(c)(3) organizations which are commonly referred to as nonprofits or charitable organizations.

Since an exempt organization that is required to file an annual return loses its exempt status if it does not do so for three consecutive years, organizations whose most recent tax return was filed in 2017 or earlier were filtered out. Thus, the assumption is that only active nonprofit organizations are represented on the map.

Latitude and longitude of the organizations were derived by using R ggmap package. Since some organizations share the same address, the number of visible dots on the map are fewer than the number of organizations in the dataset.

The IRS classifies exempt organizations using National Taxonomy of Exempt Entities (NTEE codes). We relied on this classification when grouping nonprofits on the map showing the distribution of nonprofits. How we combined NTEE codes to create the categories in this report is indicated in Table 1. However, many nonprofits cannot be clearly classified as one or another if their activities overflow the category's boundaries and/or self-identification of a nonprofit might not correspond to its IRS NTEE code.



The dataset used for the economic outlook dashboard was provided by the Washington State Employment Security Department (ESD). Data on 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations from the IRS Business Master File of the Exempt Organizations was matched with the ESD data from quarterly unemployment tax forms filed by employers in Washington State (QCEW). The dataset consists only of 501(c)(3) organizations.

Due to privacy considerations, employment and wages information is not shown for easily identifiable nonprofits (for example, there is only one nonprofit organization in Adams County which is active in Retail Trade). For this reason, data for rural counties is incomplete. However, the Washington State total wages and employment data of nonprofits reflect data of all organizations.

ESD uses The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) to classify the activities of nonprofits (Table 2). NAICS does not correspond to NTEE classification used by the IRS.

Since NAICS 2-digit code groups hospitals and social assistance organizations together, as well as religious, grantmaking, civic, professional, and similar organization with Other Services, the 3-digit NAICS code was used in order to separate them. However, it resulted in additional data being anonymized.

While map of the nonprofit organizations includes data about all organizations with 501(c)(3) tax exempt status, including unstaffed organizations, ESD includes only information about employers (nonprofits with paid staff). For charts showing jobs, the average annual employment was the indicator used.

For employment, annual average employment indicator was used.
